2008 highlights:

- Our introductory rides on the first Sunday of every month have been popular for people new to cycling. We will continue and possibly expand these rides.
- While we have a regular group of riders that go out in the mornings nearly every day of the week, we want to encourage new or intermittent riders (especially those who want to ride at a slower or faster pace) to lead rides. There are a lot of riders who love to go on rides but may want a shorter route and/or a faster or slower pace. Come down to the Applebox on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday or Sunday to join a ride, check out our website and sign up for our email list to get notices of rides.
- For the stronger riders, we will be doing the PWCC Petalumato-Truckee ride again this year. Over three days (May 16-18) we will ride 220 miles and climb 12,000 feet. Check our website (www.petalumawheelmen.org) for more information and join the club if you are not a member.
- A new order of Wheelmen jerseys and Wheelmen helmet mirrors is arriving sometime in February/March. Check the website for pricing and purchasing information.
